MAYOR'S COLUMN

Beginning on Tuesday, November 6, the Town will collect trash on Tuesdays only, shifting to a once-a-week schedule. Recycling will now be collected instead on Fridays, a change from Thursdays. Please see the detailed announcement on the next page.

This change will enable Town Public Works personnel to address a broader range of work, with less expenditure for overtime. As noted in my September column, this change from the twice-per-week collection, which the Town has followed for many years, was thoroughly discussed at the Trash Forum, please read the highlights of the September 24, 2018 Council meeting (page 7).

The Town has contracted with Municipal and Financial Services Group, from Annapolis, for a study of Town

operations and management. The study results from last spring's consideration of a Town Manager and will address questions raised during those discussions. However, the intent and design of the study is to take a wider look at what the Town does, the efficiency and effectiveness of service delivery, and its operation and management. The study will kick-off at the November 5 Council meeting with a presentation to outline and discuss the work to be done. Please come and participate.

Your participation is an important element of this study. Early on, the consultants will meet with focus groups composed of town residents, staff, councilmembers, and former mayors and councilmembers to scope the range of Town services and responsibilities as well as any issues or concerns about service delivery or fulfillment of responsibilities. focus groups, please contact me and we will pass your name on to the consultants. A summary from the focus groups will also be part of the final report.

Later the consultants will meet with Mayor and Council in public session to discuss their preliminary findings and recommendations prior to final report and will revise to address what they hear. At the study's conclusion – most likely, in February or March – the consultants will meet again with the Council to present their final report, outcomes, recommendations, and a proposed plan for implementation. All meetings will be open to Town residents.

The study should objectively apply professional methodologies, using industry standards and guidelines to evaluate Town operations and performance. In the end, the study will offer an independent, clear-eyed look at Town operations and management, including management structure and organization, responsibilities, services expected and provided, and the sufficiency of funds and personnel. Most importantly, it will provide the Council with recommendations for practical, cost-effective actions to help the Town better serve its residents.

Since 1993 Maryland cities and towns have celebrated November as Municipal Government Works Month to promote awareness of the government in their communities. We invite you to become involved by attending a Council meeting, volunteering to help the elderly with Helping Hands UP, attending a committee meeting on a subject which interests you, or participating in one of the focus groups mentioned earlier. There are many ways to be involved in our Town. In municipal government, there is always work to do, and a lot of moving parts. The Town has 28 employees, 6 of them part time, including 11 employees in the Public Works Department, 10 in the Police Department, and 7 in General Government. Weekend or weekday there is almost always someone at work for the Town on our behalf. Municipal government is closest to the people, and we expect it to protect our interests and help make our community better.

Once-A-Week Trash Collection Begins November 6

Effective November 6, the new weekly waste collection schedule will be as follows:



- Monday — Yard Waste
- Tuesday — Trash, Bulk Trash, and Compost
- Friday — Recycling
- Holidays — Any collection which falls on a holiday, will be picked up on Wednesday

Too much trash? Tips to reduce trash:

- Recycle.
- Join the Town's Compost Program.
- Keep yard waste like grass, branches, and leaves out of the trash.



Solutions to reduce cart odor:

- Use baking soda.
- Place dryer sheets in cart.
- Use vanilla extract – apply 2-3 drops on a cotton ball.

Beginning February 1, residents may purchase a larger 95-gallon replacement cart or an additional 65-gallon cart from the Town. To purchase a cart or join the Town's Compost Program, contact Public Works Director Mickey Beall at mbeall@upmd.org or call 301-927-4262 ext. 200.

Curbside Leaf Vacuuming Nov. 5-Jan. 11



Leaf vacuuming will occur November 5, 2018 through January 11, 2019.

- Crews will work counterclockwise through Town as follows: Ward 2, Ward 1, Ward 3, Ward 5, Ward 4, Ward 7 & Ward 6.
- Do not rake or blow leaves into the street.
- No rocks, sticks or metal in your leaf piles.
- Crews will not back track to collect leaves once they have been past your home.

FROM THE CHIEF & CRIME REPORT

University Park is a great place to work. As your Chief of Police, it has been an honor to serve this community and to lead the police department over the past 16+ years. I will retire as of December 31, 2018. Some will ask, why retire after only 16 years? The reality is that my first 26 years as a police officer were with the MNCPPC Police Department. I left that agency as the Assistant Chief of Police to come to University Park. After 42 years of police work, it is time.



This newsletter article is number 178 written since starting here in August of 2002. Three mayors, numerous council members, dozens of police officers, the public works staff, town hall staff, CERT Team, hundreds of town residents, their children and pets, UPES principals and teachers, the Woman's Club, Civic Association, PTA, several pastors, and the various town committees have all contributed to making my time here pleasurable.

The opportunity to see children grow up, young families move into town and citizens step up to help each other when disaster strikes is balanced with great community members who grow old and move to care facilities, retire to faraway places and also, sadly enough, pass on. History truly does repeat itself as is evident in the minutes of past council meetings as far back as the 1930s archived at the UP Town Hall. What a great read, and very insightful into the history of the Town.

Some of the events that have been a real joy include the July 4th bicycle parade, the Chili Cook-off, Halloween, the Azalea 5K, Mayfair, the Tree Lighting and Pot Luck dinner, Mutt Strut, block parties, safety forums, CERT exercises and UPES activities. The challenging events were often weather related and interesting. Snow-mageddon that lasted several days, the Derecho that lasted several minutes but took down over two hundred large trees throughout the town, torrential downpours that made streets like Claggett-Pineway, Queens Chapel Road and parts of Wells Parkway impassable, heat waves that lasted several days and involved power outages. I thank the dedicated members of the UP CERT team for their willingness to volunteer countless hours and assist

with all of these events.

Most of the messages that I have shared in my newsletter articles were learned along the way, from within this community. As anyone in UP knows there are always at least two sides to every issue. It's okay to disagree, but at least try to respect the opinions of others. Together a community can withstand anything except neglect. Take care of where you live and how you live. Stop for all stop signs, because you expect everyone to stop for the one in front of your house. Drive slowly and your child will learn your habits because the life you save may be your own. If you see something, say something. Keep your suspicion literacy sharp by judging the behavior and not the person or how they are dressed. And always be aware of your surroundings. *Thank You all for the opportunity!*

September 17 Council Meeting Highlights

Present were Mayor pro tem Martha Wells; Councilmembers (CM) Brosch, Morrissey, Verrill, Caskey, Wells, Stephen. Excused: Schultz.

Consent Agenda

Motion to approve the following consent agenda items.
Motion approved 6 to 0.

To construct a 4' fence and replace a section of existing 4' fence to enclose backyard located at 6803 Wells Parkway.

To construct a 4' fence with two gates located at 6900 Wells Parkway.

Block Party for Ward 6 at Wells Parkway Playground, Saturday, September 29, 2018 from 1-5 PM. The playground will remain open to all during this time. The police department has been notified and supports this request.

Block Party/Street Closure for 4400 block of Sheridan Street from Baltimore Avenue to 44th Avenue, Saturday, October 6, 2018 from 4-10 PM. The police department has been notified and supports this request.

Block Party/Street Closure for 4400 block of Underwood Street, Saturday, October 6, 2018 from 4-10 PM. The police department has been notified and supports this request.

Ward 1 Party/Street Closure of Tuckerman Street from 44th Ave. to 43rd Ave., Sunday, October 21, 2018 from 4 - 7 PM. The police department has been notified and supports this request.

Permits

Motion to approve the request for a building permit to replace a 12'x 24' detached garage located at 6507 43rd Avenue. Motion approved 6 to 0.

Public Comment (Note: Responses from Councilmembers, Town Attorney, or Staff are italicized.)

▪A resident of University Park who served on the faculty at the University of Maryland distributed a memo addressed to the Mayor and Town Council regarding the "Loss of Community Asset, the Championship Golf Course at U. of Maryland." He conveyed to the Council the ideas that the University has about modifying the Golf Course and suggested other alternatives that ought to be considered. *The Golf Course issue has been referred to the Development Overview Committee. The Committee is in touch with a representative from the University and a meeting will be scheduled soon to hear what their plans are.*

▪A resident expressed concern about the timing of the Development Overview Committee meeting with a representative from the University of Maryland about the Golf Course. *The University is still looking at alternatives. They are not ready to go to the Facilities Board yet and they will not be until later this fall. The State elected representatives are aware of the complaints that have been made about this and the University is aware of these complaints. A listing of the people and steps that have to be followed regarding changes to the Golf Course is available. Ms. Ferguson will email this information to the Council.*

▪A resident asked for an update on the status of the tennis court. *The Council received three options on how to handle the tennis court: 1) do nothing; 2) remove and replace for approximately \$300,000; and 3) repair with no guarantees for approximately \$35,000. The current issue is that there are no funds in the budget. The Public, Facilities and Services Committee will discuss the tennis court at their next meeting.*

▪Does the Town have any liability if someone is injured on the tennis courts? *The Town can be liable for failure to maintain, but because there is no charge for the use of the park, including the tennis courts, there is a fairly obscure law that says you can't be held liable for injury in the parks.*

Continuing Business

Motion: To adopt LR 2018-O-05 to transfer \$15,500 from Undesignated Unreserved to Line Item G4, "Architecture & Related Services - Town Hall" to cover architecture costs for a Town Hall Needs Assessment

and Recommendations with Respect to Renovation, Expansion or Replacement of Town Hall. Motion approved 6 to 0.

New Business

Motion: To approve the request for special utility permit SP-2018-04 for the installation of a submerged gravel wetland located at 6400 Wells Parkway, near the new Wells Parkway playground as part of the County's Clean Water Partnership (CWP) Plan. Motion approved 6 to 0.

Motion: As recommended by the Development Overview Committee, to oppose CB-076-2018, an Ordinance permitting the reconstruction, extension or relocation of Outdoor Advertising Signs (Billboards) that have been certified as nonconforming uses, with a digital billboard sign use, and authorize the Mayor and Town Attorney to prepare a letter to the County Council sitting as the District Council for that purpose. Motion approved 6 to 0.

Motion: As recommended by the Development Overview Committee, to provide comments to the Prince George's County Council sitting as the District Council on CB-015-2018, which repeals and re-enacts Chapter 24 of County Subdivision Regulations and authorize the Mayor and Town Attorney to prepare a letter to for that purpose. Motion approved 6 to 0.

Motion: As recommended by the Development Overview Committee, to provide comments to the Prince George's County Council sitting as the District Council on CB-10-2018, which authorizes Short-Term Rentals (Airbnb etc.) in all zones and authorize the Mayor and Town Attorney to prepare a letter for that purpose. Motion approved 6 to 0.

Note: After a discussion, the Council agreed to amend the draft letter Re: CB-10-2018, CB-11-2018, dated September 17 with the following changes: 1) remove #3, parking requirements; and 2) to add a request that there be no limit to the number of days per year an owner-occupied residence may rent to short-term guests.

Council Committee and Department Reports

Development Overview Committee The Committee met on

September 13 and a representative from the Dewey Property gave a presentation on their stormwater concept. They are planning to do the regional stormwater solution at 9 Pond which will reduce the floodwater in Wells Run by approximately six inches.

Public Facilities and Services Committee The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, September 27. Discussion will include the tennis courts. A tentative joint meeting is proposed for October 10 with the Sustainability Committee and the Trees, Parks and Environment Committee to discuss park planning.

Policy, Rules and Municipal Structure Committee The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, October 4.

Discussion will include fence heights and welcoming city planning. The Committee met on August 1 to discuss the draft scope of work for the study on Town operations. The Committee met on September 5 to discuss the issue on fence heights and welcoming city planning. Chair Linda Verrill will meet with the Mayor to discuss the process of "Welcoming City" to help expedite any activities that may come out of Committee.

Trees, Parks and the Environment Committee A survey was completed to determine where to plant ten trees donated by the County. The Committee looked for locations to plant 31 trees in Wards 2 and 3.

There is a Ward 1 Community tree planting on Saturday, October 27 at 9 AM.

Town Treasurer Dan Baden The August 2018 Treasurer's Report was distributed. The auditors will complete their fieldwork on Thursday, September 20. The RFP for the consultants is due on September 20 for the Town Manager Study.

The meeting adjourned by consent at 10 PM.

September 24 Council Meeting Highlights

Present were Mayor Carey; Councilmembers (CM) Brosch, Schultz, Morrissey, Verrill, Caskey, Wells, Stephen.

Trash Forum

Mayor Carey explained that the purpose of this Town

forum on trash is to discuss the Town's proposal to collect trash on a once-per-week schedule. Changing the trash collection to once-per-week would enable Public Works personnel to continue the broader array of services but with less expenditure for overtime during leaf-collection season and is also part of avoiding a tax increase.

There are three options under consideration: 1) collect trash once-per-week during cooler months (November through April) and twice-per-week during hotter months (May-October); 2) collect trash once-per-week all year; and 3) make no change – maintain the twice-per week schedule all year but this would necessitate the Council finding an additional \$25,000 in the budget to pay for overtime during leaf-collection season. The Council will make the final decision at the October 1 Council meeting.

Presentation

- Public Works Director Mickey Beall made a proposal to collect trash once-per-week, a change from the twice-per-week schedule.
- There was a desire not to increase Town taxes. Eliminating an employee from the Public Works Department was one way of saving money.
- The purpose of going to once-per-week trash pick-up is a cost savings. In doing so, the Town can save approximately \$25,000 in overtime costs during leaf-collection season.
- Mr. Beall recommends Option 1. This will allow his staff to focus on other needs throughout the Town during the cold months. He also believes that having twice-per-week collection during the summer months will help eliminate concerns that most likely will arise such as smell, vermin, residents who accumulate a lot of trash. If the Council chooses this option, Mr. Beall would prefer Friday for the pick-up date. The start date for the new schedule would be November 2 through April 30 and beginning Tuesday, May 3 the schedule would revert back to twice-per-week trash pick-up
- For those residents who accumulate a lot of trash, Mr. Beall suggested that the Council could consider the following: the Town would provide a second trash container, a larger trash container or the resident purchase a trash container.
- A chart was distributed that shows the history (11 years) of what gets collected in Town.
- Mr. Beall responded to a question by saying he is not sure of the outcome of other municipalities who have gone through this same process, but he assumes that some residents feel it works well and others don't.
- Mr. Beall responded to a question by saying that with the additional 2,400 man-hours, by going to once-per-week pick-up, his staff would have time to clear out the vines along the creek, tree watering, field maintenance, signs, litter, weeds, etc.
- Mr. Beall agreed to the suggestion of making the trash-pick up for Tuesdays. He thought the best schedule would be Monday, yard waste; Tuesday, trash collection; Friday, recycling.
- A resident commented that the street sweeping that was done in the past was very nice and suggested that this be done again, maybe once or twice a year. Mayor Carey responded by saying that the street sweeping program has been eliminated as a necessary economy to avoid raising taxes. The Public Works Department is currently working on a solution to clean the streets.
- Several residents expressed their support with once-per-week trash collection all year round.
- A resident suggested putting an "odor-eater" in the trashcart to help with the smell.
- A resident suggested monitoring the change very closely, especially during the initiation. The County has gone to once-per-week trash pick-up and many residents had a rough time with the transition. Some of the rentals in University Park are multi-person and these homes put out a lot of trash. The trash falls out of their cans even with twice-per-week trash collection.
- A resident asked what kind of time would be added to the Public Works employees if the Town went to full Town required composting. Mr. Beall said that essentially it would be replacing a trash collection with a compost collection. It would require different equipment and multiple staff.
- Mr. Beall responded to a question that the current recycling truck is not set up to split the trash. In order to split it, that would require separate collections or have the ability to separate it at the vehicle.
- 65-gallon trash containers range from \$65 to \$85 depending on the number purchased.
- Mayor Carey said that he is inclined to go with a once-per-week trash pick-up year round. He has received

emails with a positive response to this suggestion and for the few people who will have problems with this, he believes a second trash container or a larger trash container will address their concerns.

- CM Wells requested that information be available for the next Council meeting on how the Town wants to manage the homes that want a second container. Will there be a fee, does the homeowner purchase a second container and how much would it cost, should there be an annual surcharge for a second container or should the Town give a free second container.
- The change to once-per-week trash pick-up will eliminate having to contract labor during leaf-collection season.
- A resident suggested a time-based fee for the second trashcan so people are encouraged to purchase a second trashcan and the fee should be low.
- A resident suggested that the Town consider fining the homeowners who throw *everything* in the trash.

Public Comment and Discussion (*Note: Responses from Councilmembers, Staff, Town Attorney or the Mayor are italicized.*)

A resident expressed his concern about the plan by the University of Maryland to develop one of the last remaining green spaces in our broader neighborhood. It is one of the most environmentally sensitively managed golf courses in the state of Maryland. The Council was encouraged to take a position on this to oppose the development of green space and for the University to look at alternatives in a transparent and professional way. *This issue will go through the Development Overview Committee. Arrangements are being made to meet with a University of Maryland representative in October to discuss the Golf Course.*

The plan is to remove four golf holes, which means the Golf Course will no longer be used for certified competitions. Another concern is the plan for “field parking” that will create runoff problems.

Department and Council Reports

Mayor’s Report

- Mayor Carey thanked CM Wells, as Mayor pro tem, for presiding at the last Council meeting during his recent absence.
- A request for proposals went out for the Town Operations and Management Study. Seven responses were

received and the bids range from \$12,500 to \$35,000. A team consisting of Dan Baden, Andrea Marcavitch, Martha Wells, Roland Stephen, Laurie Morrissey and Joseph Thompson will help Mayor Carey review the proposals and a recommendation will then come to the Council at the October 1 Council meeting.

- Chief Wynnyk has informed Mayor Carey that he plans to retire from the University Park Police Department effective in late December 2018. The Town will be advertising to fill the position and applications/resumes are due by November 1. According to the Town Code, the Chief of Police is appointed by the Mayor with the approval of the Council.
- CM Stephen said that there is continuing considerable distress at the lack of progress about the bridge. CM Stephen said, “if there is an opportunity for a detailed, somewhat retrospective account of how we got where we are, it would help people understand. Something on the communication side is due now.” Mayor Carey responded by saying that this project is tied up in DPIE and that he has asked the County Executive’s office for help.

Council and Committee Reports

Development Overview Committee The Committee will meet in early October with a representative from the University of Maryland to discuss the plans for the Golf Course. The exact date and place for this meeting has not been confirmed. The Committee is working on the Zoning Rewrite, which still has many issues.

Policy, Rules and Municipal Structure Committee The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, October 4, 7-8:30 PM at Town Hall.

Police, Traffic and Public Safety Committee The next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, October 17. The September 25 meeting was cancelled.

Sustainability Committee The next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, September 26. The Committee is working on the composting pilot.

Public Facilities and Services Committee The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, September 27. The Committee will discuss the tennis courts and park planning.

Town Clerk Tracey Toscano There has been a change in the Town bus driver. Donald, the evening bus driver, is required to wait one year before reapplying for his license, so Sheila will fill in during this time. Ms. Toscano pointed out that many residents comment about how accommodating Public Works employees are and that they are grateful for the services provided.

Chief of Police Wynnyk

- The August 2018 Crime Report was distributed.
- There was heavy traffic enforcement for the months of August and September: 60 State citations; 80 warnings were given.
- The red-light camera contract will soon expire. We are currently renegotiating another contract.
- Regarding code compliance, the number of rentals in University Park is down by approximately 80. Approximately 95% of rental inspections have been completed.
- CERT (Citizens Emergency Response Team) was involved in an exercise at Prince George's Community College.
- Chief Wynnyk encouraged Councilmembers to review their Emergency Plan.
- Chief Wynnyk confirmed that he will retire at the end of the year. He looks forward to helping Mayor Carey with the process of hiring a new Police Chief.
- CM Verrill asked if the department is still assisting with crossing at the school. Chief Wynnyk said yes. Due to the shortage of crossing guards, the County confirmed that the numbers are not there to justify a crossing guard at University Park Elementary School.
- CM Verrill asked what about the equipment attached to the stop sign at Baltimore Avenue and Underwood Street. Mr. Beall said that a company is being contracted to put traffic monitoring along Baltimore Avenue at multiple intersections. A request has been made to see if the Town could have access to that information.
- Chief Wynnyk reported that the red-light camera on Route 1 and East West Highway, southbound, has reported over 1.2 million cars this year.
- Chief Wynnyk is considering getting a second red-light

camera and two speed cameras.

Director of Public Works Michael Beall

- Upcoming Events: October 20, Electronic Recycling and Paper Shredding at University Park Elementary School. October 27, volunteer tree planting.
- The house that was destroyed by fire, next to Town Hall, has made progress (enclosed with a roof).
- The Davey Tree Company (contractor for Pepco) is in Town to plan their vegetation management program along the electrical lines.
- WSSC are getting ready to begin work on Clagett Road. The crew that will be working in front of the school will be on a limited schedule (school hours) to avoid any interference with the school traffic. A third crew will soon start work on Woodberry Street. The Adelphi Road crew plan to complete their project by Thanksgiving.
- CM Verrill complimented how the WSSC contract crew cleaned up their area at the end of each day.

The meeting adjourned by consent 9:25 PM.

October 1 Council Meeting Highlights

Present were Mayor Carey; Councilmembers (CM) Brosch, Schultz, Morrissey, Verrill, Caskey, Wells, Stephen.

Permits

Motion to approve the request for a building permit to replace existing walkway from house to curb and add 4" brick border on each side located at 6814 Pineway. The proposed construction includes a 4' extension into the curb box, which is in the Town right-of-way. As part of the permit, the Town would grant a license for the walkway to be placed in the right of way, subject to removal by the applicants if required by the Town with notice. Issuance of permit and grant of license does not convey to applicants any fee or easement property rights to the right-of-way. Applicants are required to sign a license agreement. Motion approved 7 to 0.

Continuing Business

Motion: On recommendation of the Committee on Trees, Parks and the Environment, to amend the Shade Tree Reimbursement Program to also include

understory trees, allowing reimbursement of up to \$100.00 toward the purchase price of any tree listed in the official Town understory tree list and planted on private property within the Town, not to exceed a total of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) per five years to any individual household or property; and to request that the Town Attorney draft an Ordinance for Council approval to revise Chapter 16 Tree Maintenance, Section 16-104 Tree Replacement to include understory trees in the program. Motion approved 7 to 0. Note: Mayor Carey asked that the Committee on Trees, Parks and Environment come back with a proposal that encourages planting of large canopy trees.

New Business

Motion: To adopt Resolution 2018-R-05 to change trash collection from twice a week pick up on Tuesdays and Fridays to once a week pick up on Tuesdays and to move recycling pickup to Fridays starting on November 6, 2018. Motion approved 7 to 0. Note: The Council agreed to a three-month moratorium on distributing a second or larger trash cart. The Public Works Department was asked to come back with a report on the demand for extra trash carts and a plan for charging for a second or larger trash cart.

Motion: To introduce the fiscal year 2018 budget transfers as recommended in the September 24, 2018 memo from Treasurer Dan Baden, as reflected below.







My local draft board called me to serve when, as a newlywed with another year of graduate school remaining, there were so many things I would much rather have done. Yet I was dropped off at a diner in Cooperstown, one day in early June, and inducted into the United States Army. I was thankful that I went to Korea, not Vietnam, but it wasn't much fun. Of the 20 members of my high school graduating class, 6 of us served, and 5 of us returned and reentered life and community as have so many of our neighbors.

In University Park, there are many men and women veterans among us who with great sacrifice have left behind lives, families, schools, and jobs and other plans to serve their country. Our community has established a Veterans Memorial park and dedicated it "to honor all who served," and many of our neighbors will gather there this November 11 to observe Veterans Day. I encourage you to read these names of people from our community who have served or are currently serving our country. We honor our veterans best by remembering their service.

In recent years, town residents have worked together to build and maintain a census of University Park residents who served in the armed forces of the United States. My thanks to Joann Fletcher who largely built this census. Also, my appreciation to Phineas Baugher, David Fosse, and Matthew Kinnard who are continuing it.
